What are phrasal verbs?

Phrasal verbs are phrases that indicate actions. They are generally used in spoken English and informal texts. Examples of such verbs include: turn down, come across and run into.

Phrasal verbs consist of a verb and a preposition or an adverb:

Literal meaning

Some phrasal verbs have a literal meaning. They can be easily understood.

She opened the door and looked outside.

She was walking across the street when she heard the sound of an explosion.

Idiomatic meaning:

Phrasal verbs can also have a figurative or idiomatic meaning which makes them difficult to understand.



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Can you put me up for tonight?

The phrasal verb 'put up' here does not mean to build (as in putting a fence up). It has, however, an idiomatic/figurative meaning. It means to let someone stay in your house.

Can/Cannot

Can is a modal verb.

Can is used to express ability or to say that something is possible.

Can is the same for all subjects. We don't add an 'S' in the third person (like other verbs)

The verb that comes after Can is in the infinitive without to:

- I can *speak* Spanish. (= it is possible for me to speak Spanish = I have the ability to speak Spanish)
- He can *swim* well.
- We can *see* our neighbour in the garden.
- They can *play* the guitar.

Negative

To form the negative we add "not" after can to form one word: cannot.

We can also contract the negative to form can't. (can't = cannot)

- I cannot *play* the piano. We can't *go* to the cinema tonight.
- She cannot *speak* French very well. He can't *drive* a car.
